

RE: RCMP CONTRACT MANDATE

1. DECISION REQUEST

To review and provide feedback on the issue identification stage of a process to develop a proposed mandate for RCMP contract negotiations.

2. INTRODUCTION

The UBCM is looking to begin to develop a mandate for RCMP contract negotiations which will take place over the next few years. The UBCM will be establishing a Local Government Working Group to advise it on the negotiations and will be appointing a Local Government Representative to be a member of the provincial negotiating team. This document is intended to assist the UBCM and those advising it when the negotiations proceed.

Outlined below is some background information related to the contract process and a list of key issues that have been identified up to this point. We are looking for any comments or suggestions that you may have.

UBCM will be looking for further local government input into the development of the mandate for RCMP contract negotiations as more information is provided.

3. BACKGROUND

The federal and provincial government signed an agreement in 1981 that the cost-sharing formula for RCMP policing would increase for municipalities between 5,000 and 15,000 population from 56% in 1981 to 70% by 1992 and for municipalities over 15,000 population from 81% in 1981 to 90% by 1992. The last RCMP contract negotiations between the federal government and the provinces took place in 1991/92 and a twenty agreement was reached at that time to keep the cost-sharing formula for RCMP policing costs at the 1992 level for the full length of the new agreement. The current RCMP contract expires on March 31, 2012.

There are three RCMP policing agreements in BC:

- Federal/Provincial agreement entitled Provincial Police Services Agreement;
- Federal/Provincial master municipal agreement entitled Municipal Policing Agreement;

and other technology) without consultation with those paying (i.e. local government);

Affordability – escalating police costs above the cost of living;

• Length of Contract – need opportunity to review contract and time frame to reflect changes in the delivery of police services.

Governance/Accountability

- Reporting/accountability on policing priorities (i.e. municipal input) current process for communication on policing priorities is more "informative" driven than "collaborative" driven. Local governments need a voice in setting the priorities and need to be shown how the RCMP have done in meeting those objectives;
- Alignment of priorities between local government and RCMP better define role of municipal policing vs. global/national crime;
- Service delivery, goals, objectives and measures must be developed in partnership with local government;
- **Dispute Resolution/Discussion Mechanism** There is an arbitrariness to the existing contract where standards can be set by the RCMP and the Minister. These standards should be stated and included or a mechanism created to reach consensus with the RCMP, Minister and local government;
- **Performance Standards** standards should be agreed to and who will provide which resources agreed to; contract needs "failure" to perform clauses and redress for the community;
- Small Communities and Rural Areas New language to enshrine in the contract responsibilities to and from communities under 5,000 population and rural areas, not just direction.

Financial Accountability

- Cost control evidence that cost savings are being put in place and no downloading of costs; portion of officer time doing office work is at issue;
- Budgeting for full compliment if we pay for "x" number of members, we should get that number;
- **Certainty of budget** knowing budget requirements at appropriate time and phase-in of large increases; opportunity to provide input on budget;
- Budget accountability is lacking priority identification with local government; budget planning (PRIME, facilities etc.); more accountability in terms of local government accounting rules and local government fiscal year which differs from RCMP fiscal period need for greater financial accountability for expenditures; need for timely and accurate financial information.

Service Delivery

- **Service delivery** How can police service be delivered more efficiently, more responsively?; What's an acceptable level of service?;
- Equity of Service meeting authorized strength with experienced members (balance) rural vs. urban; veteran vs. rookie;
- Vacancy Rate maximum of 4%; a "guarantee" of appropriate manpower/delivery of service lack of officers to fill vacant positions; penalize the federal government if they are not able to deliver.

Air Quality Issues in Grand Forks

Thank you for taking time to meet with the representatives of the City of Grand Forks and the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary.

The following is a brief outline of the issues on air quality in Grand Forks and the District.

BACKGROUND:

Grand Forks air quality has been ranked one of the worst in the interior since the early 90's. Past reports from the Ministry of the Environment had demonstrated that on a significant number of days the particulate matter in the air exceeded the Canadian Wide Standards. Citizens from both the municipality and the two adjoining regional district electoral areas supported a change in an attitude towards air quality.

COMMUNITY INITIATIVE:

The Boundary Air Quality Committee (BAQC) is an initiative taken by the City and the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary-Electoral Areas C & D in January 2006 when representatives from industry, health, government, and the public were invited to form an independent committee based on the example of several other BC communities. This committee has met at least once a month since January. All sectors in the community are educating themselves on the air quality issues that will lead to airshed management.

The City and the Regional District together have contributed \$33,000.

Dear Ms. Conroy

Thank you for taking time to meet with the City representatives concerning the delivery of ambulance service within the Grand Forks Region.

The Citizens are concerned that the staffing levels and the availability of ambulances on a short notice might not reflect the changing environment in the delivery of health care services as it relates to the transportation of maternity cases to Trail, Nelson or Kelowna. While it is accepted that ambulances are available for the majority of maternity cases referred to by the Hospital to either Trail, Nelson or Kelowna, there is no return transportation provision made for the patient back to Grand Forks. Further it is believed that when a doctor is not available at either Trail or Nelson for maternity cases, the patient is given a choice to either use the ambulance service for a fee or utilize her own transportation. In some instances this can be very stressful and low income families cannot afford such fees.

While the foregoing policy might have been acceptable at the formative stages of the ambulance service, it no longer meets the acceptable standard of health care when major components of health care services have been centralized in larger urban centres.

The City requests ambulance service to seek funding from either the Health Authority or the Provincial government to cover the cost of transportation to and from the point of origin and when a doctor is unavailable in either Trail or Nelson, the cost of transportation should also be borne by the ambulance service.

The City looks forward to a favourable response that reflects the change in policy to relieve the cost of transportation presently borne by patients.

This letter outlines the rational and requirements for the Application for Waterworks Construction Permit for the installation of secondary disinfection at the source water wells for the City of Grand Forks.

BACKGROUND

The City has on occasion experienced the presence of Coliform bacteria over the last several months at the Eastside Reservoir. While some or all of the Total Coliform may be attributed to re-growth, efforts were made by the City to search for potential source(s) of the Coliform bacteria.

On July 25, 2007, a water sample from the Eastside Reservoir was found to be positive for both Total Coliform and E.Coli counts. Based on the presence of the E.Coli, a Boil Water Notice was issued by the City in consultation with the Interior Health Authority (IHA). The City continues with efforts to locate any potential sources of cross-connections which may have led to the presence of the E.Coli. At the same time, flushing and disinfection of the water distribution system was implemented. Since then, the manual addition of chlorine at the Eastside reservoir has been continuing on a regular cycle to maintain a secondary disinfection residual in the water distribution system.

On July 30, 2007, a meeting was held between members of the City, IHA and Kerr Wood Leidal Associates Ltd (KWL) to discuss the Coliform Bacteria in the City's water system, the City's response strategy and preventative actions. The IHA agreed with the position that installation of primary disinfection was not warranted as there was no evidence that the single occurrence of E.Coli at the Eastside reservoir was from any of the existing well water sources. In addition, the

The calcium hypchlorite tablets specified initially and recommended for future operation are the scale-inhibiting form manufactured by PPG Industries. These tablets are certified for use in drinking water (NSF 60).

PIPING

The buried portion of the proposed injection lines to Wells 4 and Well 3 are 19 mm (¾ inch) in diameter and to be composed of non-corroding material approved for potable water use (NSF 61) and must meet the City's standards for service line connections. With the exception of the certification required, an exact material has not been specified as the City is working with local contractors with a plan to complete the work in the shortest time possible. The flexibility on the pipe material has been provided to potentially take advantage of product in stock or more readily available to the contractors.

The chlorine analyzer lines for all locations are to be 12 mm (½ inch) in diameter and composed of material approved for potable water use (NSF 61). Based upon discussions with the City, we understand that these lines will be standard copper pipe service lines.


Since the Well No.2 has two injection pumps, only the P1 and P2 faults are applicable for this location.

The City has elected to connect all of the above alarms through their SCADA system to report to the monitoring computer at the Public Works Yard.

I have reviewed the above letter and respond as follows.

Mr Simm's estimate of the numbers of people dead and hospitalized is flawed and once again misrepresents the information contained in the National Ambient Air Quality Objectives for Particulate Matter reports.

This is an extract directly from the Science Assessment Document

"12. Human Health Effects - Epidemiological Studies

12.2.5 Summary of Results on Acute Mortality

Nineteen studies which investigated the relationship of daily variations in mortality with particulate air pollution using modern time-series methods were reviewed in detail."

This excerpt clearly indicates that when the study is discussing "mortality" it is discussing it as "daily variations in mortality".

Furthermore Mr. Simm's quoted page 10 of the addendum to the Science Assessment Document as his source for the % increases in mortality and hospitalizations. Here is another extract from that same paragraph that indicates when mortality is discussed; it is in terms of daily deaths.

"The magnitude of the increase was about the same for British Smoke as for PM₁₀. A 1% increase in daily deaths per 10 mg/m³ * increase in BS." (the * is mine as I'm confident it should read ug/m³)

Dear Mayor Krog:

I am writing with respect to several *proposed* Class A provincial parks and protected areas that may be of interest to your municipality/district. These park and protected area sites were either identified and recommended via the Kootenay Boundary Land Use Plan (KBLUP) or originated from the Okanagan Shuswap Land and Resource Management Plan (OSLRMP) which were approved by the provincial government in 1995 and 2001 respectively. Both land use planning processes recommended the designation of Goal 1 (large) protected areas or parks and Goal 2 (small) protected areas or parks.


Over the past several years, the Ministry of Environment and the Integrated Land Management Bureau (the agency that monitors and coordinates the land use planning process in the province) have endeavoured to move forward with provincial park or protected area designation for these recommended sites. Whereas many of the Goal 1 sites have now been formally designated, numerous Goal 2 sites currently have no level of protection afforded to them and have been the emphasis for both agencies. Our planning section has recently resolved outstanding issues with respect to access and other impediments to establishment in several Goal 2 areas and the intention is to move forward with Class A 'Provincial Park' status for select sites and for other sites, an interim designation as 'Protected Area' (under the *Environment and Land Use Act*).


Within these sites, any existing authorized uses such as guide outfitting, trapping and cattle grazing will be allowed to continue. Attached to this letter are maps to help gain perspective on the geographical context (relevant to your district/municipality) and approximate size of the proposed provincial parks and protected areas.



RATE REDUCTIONS FOR 2008

PricewaterhouseCoopers, the MIA's actuary, presented the results of its analysis of the MIA's current claims pattern and risk profile to your Board, along with its recommendations for 2008 rates. The Board used this information to settle on an over all 10% rate reduction for the coming year. This will be reflected in Renewal Quotations that will be sent to members soon for budgeting purposes.

There are currently several local governments who are considering joining the MIA commencing January

2008. If they choose to do so, the quoted Administration Assessment will be reduced as these costs can be spread over a wider population base. In addition, our reinsurance renewal negotiations are about to commence. If these go well, actual reinsurance costs may be less than those anticipated in the quotation. As a result of these contingencies, there is a possibility that the renewal invoice members receive in December will be somewhat lower than the quotation we will be providing shortly.

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CITY OF KAMLOOPS WINS RISK MANAGEMENT ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The centerpiece of the MIA's 20th Anniversary celebrations was a competition for a special Risk Management Achievement Award. The award was made to the MIA member who has the best record of implementing risk management programs over the MIA's first twenty years, using the principles of identification, measure, and monitor. Faye Salisbury, Chair of the Risk Management Committee, announced at the AGM that the MIA's 20th Anniversary Risk Management Achievement Award goes to the City

of Kamloops. The City received a 10% rebate of its 2007 assessment (worth over \$47,000) and a permanent trophy.

The City's risk management programs have contributed to the City's ability to respond to the needs of the community by lowering the cost of risk and preventing injuries. In addition the City has achieved positive claims results through the adoption of Council approved policies and reinforcement of operational documentation.

PROPOSED BY: Procedure Bylaw / City Manager

SUMMARY:

Under the City's Procedures Bylaw No. 1794, 2006, the Order of Business permits the members of Council to report to the Community on issues, bring community issues for discussion and initiate action through motions of Council, ask questions on matters pertaining to the City Operations and inquire on any issues and reports.

STAFF SUGGESTION FOR HANDLING QUESTIONS AND INQUIRIES: (no motion is required for this)

Option 2: Issues which seek information on City Operations or have been brought to the attention of the Members of Council prior to the meeting of Council should be referred to the City Manager so that Staff can provide background and any additional information in support of the issues and the member can report at the meeting on the issue including the information provided by Staff. Further the member may make motions on issues that require actions. It is in the interest of fiscal responsibility members may wish to avoid committing funding without receiving a report on its impact on the operations and property taxation.

OPTIONS AND ALTERNATIVES:

Option 1: Submit a motion for Approval: Under this option, a member might wish to submit an immediate motion for expediency to resolve an issue or problem brought forward by a constituent. This approach might catch other members by surprise, result in conflict and might not resolve the problem.

Option 2: Issues, Questions and Inquiries should be made with the intent to resolve problems, seek clarification and take actions on behalf of constituents. Everyone is well served when research has been carried out on the issue and all relevant information has been made available prior to the meeting. It is recognized that at times this may not be possible and the request may have to be referred to another meeting of Council.

BENEFITS, DISADVANTAGES AND NEGATIVE IMPACTS:

Option 1: The main advantage of using this approach is to bring the matter before Council on behalf of constituents. Immediate action might result in inordinate amount of resource inadvertently directed without specific approval in the financial plan.

Option 2: The main advantage is that there is a genuine interest to resolve issues and seek clarifications without spending too much resources of the City. The disadvantage is that there may be issues brought forward which have no direct municipal jurisdiction, however, due to the motion of Council arising from the issue, resources are directed and priorities are altered without due process.

COSTS AND BUDGET IMPACTS – REVENUE GENERATION:

Both options could result in expenditures being incurred as a result of a motion on an issue without supporting documentation and report on its implications.

LEGISLATIVE IMPACTS, PRECEDENTS, POLICIES:

The Procedure Bylaw is the governing document setting out the Order of Business at a Council meeting.
