Councillor Wirischagin

Councillor Wirischagin reported on the following:

- Reported on his attendance at a meeting with representatives from the Grand Forks International and members of City Staff to discuss the level of service that the City intends to provide during the ball tournament this year. He stated that Staff has advised that there is no funding for washroom cleaning and night lawn mowing to be done outside of normal working hours. He reported that the GFI is working towards dealing with the matter. Councillor Wirischagin stated that the Grand Forks International (GFI) is an essential institution in Grand Forks.
- Reported on his attendance at the AKBLG this past week. He advised that from a social networking point of view, Council is in stronger position now than they were going into the conference.
- Reported on a number of cultural performances that took place over the last two weeks, stating that we have some very talented individuals living in our community.

Councillor Moslin:

Councillor Moslin reported on the following:

- Advised that the Black Train Bridge has been decked by the Canadian military. He thanked all those who contributed.
- Reported on his attendance at the AKBLG held last week, stating that five resolutions, proposed by the City of Grand Forks, were passed by the AKBLG membership and will be forwarded on to UBCM in September. He stated that these resolutions include, the proposed

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benefit plan group for volunteer firemen, a resolution requesting that the province develop a home renovation checklist, a resolution calling for the establishment of a protocol for rail line abandonment, a resolution calling for the establishment of a separate local government election act, and a resolution proposing that local investment of carbon off-set funds remain in the Kootenays.

- Reported on the presentation regarding the Carbon Neutral Kootenays, the program spearheaded by RDKB, RDCK, and RDEK for the benefit of all Kootenay Boundary communities.
- Stated that the Integrated Community Sustainability Plan is now available on the City's website.
- Commented that the Sound of Music presentation, held in Grand Forks over the past weeks, was a delightful performance, and a wonderful illustration of the depth of talent of our Grand Forks residents.





Your Worship Mayor Taylor, Members of Council, Staff and Gallery viewers. My name is Brian Fletcher and I thank you for the opportunity to stand before you this evening to introduce the newest initiative to attract visitors to Grand Forks and the Boundary region.

The Kettle River Mountain Bikers' Association is leading this initiative by producing a mountain bike trail guide for the 2009 season and funding plays a big part in the success of such projects. Tourism BC and the Thompson Okanagan Tourism Association have endorsed this project by providing us with \$4750.00 of the \$9,500.00 needed to complete the printing of this booklet.

However, given the economic challenges including the loss of industrial contributors to our local tax base and the employment picture, we recognize that City Council is looking to the future to provide new opportunities and leadership. This is already evident with the hiking and biking trail system that is evolving throughout our city and region by not only reducing our carbon footprint but also by bringing awareness of the health benefits of using these trails.

Although grant-in-aid funding is not available at present, it is my intent to make you all aware of what is happening in the community with both businesses and organizations that have come on board to help produce this mountain bike trail guide. We have already had verbal endorsement of this project from a number of local businesses and organizations including Wildways, Chain Reaction Ride and Slide and the Grand Forks Cycling Club.

This new trail guide will replace the one last printed in 2004. The community has been without a current trail resource for 2-3 years and so this new guide will fill a void in the promotional tools we have available in our area. The new guide will include GPS generated maps, trail descriptions, level of skill needed, length of trail in distance and time and how to find the trailhead. This booklet will profile 15 local trails over 20 pages ranging from Thimble Mountain trail in the west to the Vertical Smile to the east of Christina Lake. The number of copies proposed is 10,000 with distribution of the guide being sent across the Thompson/Okanagan and Kootenay/Boundary regions and of course locally as well.

We believe that this new guide will provide our community with an invaluable resource in the promotion of our local recreational assets. It will assist us especially at the local bike shops in directing visiting cyclists to the various trailheads in the area. It will also help promote our region as a place to visit and a place to revisit by its distribution into other regions. When this guide brings visitors here and encourages them to stay a while many local businesses will benefit from motels and B&Bs to dining establishments to bike shops.

If this project does not happen this year we will be delaying a great opportunity to help our community to get back on its feet.

The support we are seeking from City Council is an endorsement of this project by committing to the purchase of a \$250.00 advertisement in the new mountain bike trail guide. If unexpected funds do become available we request that Council view this as a priority project for financial support today and in the future. Again, thank you for this opportunity to present.
