March & April 2016 program outline for Public Works

Spring has arrived early this year allowing us to get a bit of a jump on the spring cleanup.

- Thatching and turf cleanup of our parks, grounds and green spaces.
- Cleaning out debris and cutting back last year's dead plant material from all of our flower beds
- Amending the soil in preparation for another year of outstanding
- Pruning and shaping of our many ornamental shrubs and trees also
- Pruning and cutting back the large inventory of beautiful boulevard trees within city limits.

City roads, sidewalks, and many km's of walking trails require a lot of cleanup and maintenance once the snow has made its exit for another

- Sweeping up streets and sidewalks of all the winter sand put down for added traction.
- Pothole patching, alley grading and hole filling which are a re-





sult of excess water being held on the road surfaces over the winter and the freeze thaw that comes with winter & spring.

Spring also brings out the sports enthusiasts, soccer, baseball, rugby and ultimate Frisbee to name just a few of the sports being played on our many sports fields throughout

- Top dressing & seeding holes, weeding and prepping ball diamond skins, fence repair on back catches, cleaning out the dugouts and redefining edges will all be taking place.
- Cleaning and washing the skateboard park and tennis/pickleball courts.
- Cleanup of popular beaches and placement of some 70 plus picnic tables at your favorite spots to relax and enjoy the beauty that surrounds us in this valley.

Sewer and Water Update

Our water and sewer Operators are looking forward to starting our spring programs. Due to the continuing great weather that we have enjoyed this mild winter, we have been able to get a jump on various water and sewer construction and repair items that would have had to wait through the cold season. Our spring maintenance items for March and April include:

- Fire hydrant inspections and maintenance. We have over 260 hydrants that need to be in top working condition for our Fire Department to use in case of a fire emergency.
- Water main flushing. Flushing water mains are done as part of a scheduled preventative maintenance program to remove sediment that gradually deposits in
- the pipes and helps maintain water quality in our system. We recycle the flushed water in coordination with our downtown washdown and boulevard cleanup. Watch for the water main flushing notice that will be posted on our City of Grand Forks website, our Facebook page and in the newspaper for specific dates.
- Well exercise and maintenance. Operators run and exercise a maintenance schedule for each of our five wells to ensure seamless operation for the high demand months of the summer.

These maintenance items are part of the ongoing efforts to efficiently deliver a quality water product to our homes, schools and businesses.
